

Access to Income Security for Families Raising Children and Youth with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities

- Many families raising children and youth with disabilities live in poverty and struggle to have a good standard of living.
- Canada agreed to follow the <u>UN Convention on the Rights of the Child</u> (1991), which says families should receive the financial support needed to make sure all children, including children with disabilities, can realize their right to a good standard of living.
- All families should have enough income to meet their needs and fully participate in all aspects of their community, even if they are unable to work.

Key Challenges

- Families raising children and youth with intellectual and developmental disabilities are **more likely to live in poverty** due to:
 - o Inadequate supports, and
 - o Higher housing, healthcare, transportation, and daily living costs.
- Without access to inclusive child care, including before and after-school care, parents and caregivers may have to give up their jobs.
- Without access to employment, some families rely on income assistance programs, but benefit rates are too low.

How to Make People's Lives Better

Increase Benefit Amounts

• Guarantee income assistance and Persons with Disability (PWD) **benefit rates that lift families to the poverty line** and are indexed to inflation, with the ultimate goal of securing a livable income.

Reduce Costs and Remove Barriers to Child Care and Employment

- Create a Provincial Disability Strategy that includes fully resourced health and disabilityrelated supports for all children and youth with disabilities to eliminate out of pocket costs for families.
- Provide access to a fully resourced, universal, inclusive, culturally safe, and affordable early
 learning and child care model that includes before and after-school care and age-appropriate
 support for youth aged 12+ so parents can fully participate in the workforce.
